OPENING CEREMONIES:

Council Member Janson provided the invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

CALL TO ORDER:

Mayor Hoffman called the meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. She noted Council Member Golding was joining via speakerphone.

ROLL CALL:

Also present were: City Manager Mike Staffopoulos, City Attorney Sandra Robinson, Chief Financial Officer Ashlie Gossett, Director of Human Resources Kimberlee Bennett, Director of Public Works Dennis Barron, Property and Procurement Officer Luis Flores, Planning and Development Director Heather Ireland, and City Clerk Sheri Gosselin.

Council Member Nichols inquired if there were any requirements or restrictions to permit an absent Council Member to vote remotely.

A conversation ensued regarding this topic. City Attorney Sandra Robinson confirmed there were no provisions in state law prohibiting voting from a remote location. City Manager Mike Staffopoulos added there were no current policies in place.

The Council reached a consensus to place an item for discussion on the next Council Briefing agenda regarding this topic and proceed with the meeting tonight, permitting Council Member Golding to vote remotely.

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Council Member Golding thanked Mayor Hoffman for attending the [Beaches Watch] State of the Beaches meeting on January 12, 2022. She reminded the public of the special City Council

Briefing on January 20, 2022, to discuss height limits and liquor licenses. Ms. Golding shared the Urban Trails Master Plan meeting would be held on January 26, 2022. Additionally, she announced Code of Ethics training would be held on January 28, 2022.

Mr. Nichols noted he recently became aware the City of Jacksonville issued a request for proposal (RFP) for the pier's management. He asked for consensus from the Council to have City Manager Mike Staffopoulos request the City of Jacksonville turn over management and operation of the pier to Jacksonville Beach.

Mayor Hoffman confirmed there was a consensus to discuss the topic further.

Mr. Nichols asked for consensus from the Council to have Mayor Hoffman contact the City of Jacksonville's Planning Department to see if they could add Jacksonville Beach's A1A corridor to their Complete Streets project. He noted another option was for Mr. Staffopoulos to email the TPO (North Florida Transportation Planning Organization) representative to request adding the item to the list for a planning study.

Mayor Hoffman thanked the Rhoda L. Martin Cultural Heritage Center for hosting the Martin Luther King Jr. Day event on January 15, 2022. She thanked Council Member Dumont and City Attorney Sandra Robinson for attending and representing and City.

Mayor Hoffman stated she would miss the next Council meeting [February 7, 2022] due to travel for Florida League of Mayors events.

Director of Human Resources Kimberlee Bennett noted there had been many changes in the labor market and workforce since the last case study was completed over two years ago. She noted there were two responses to the RFP and requested approval from the Council for the City Manager to enter into a contract with Cody & Associates.

Purpose of Briefing

The purpose of the Briefing was to update the Council members about ongoing items in the City.

City Manager

Number of alcohol licenses allowed within the City

Attorney Cliff Shepard reviewed a PowerPoint presentation [on file] regarding Liquor License Limitation, Chapter 1, Section 2: Jacksonville Beach Charter. Mr. Shepard explained the City's options for change and the possible positive and negative issues due to a change in additional alcohol licenses.

A conversation ensued regarding the current number of alcohol licenses allowed within the City, the possibility of increasing the number of licenses allowed, and different metrics to decide the number of possible additional alcohol licenses for the future.

The Council's consensus was to make no changes to the current number of alcohol licenses allowed within the City. In the future, the date to be determined, the City may hire an outside consultant to conduct a study to provide information on ways to determine an appropriate increase of alcohol licenses within the City.

Results of the Open House on January 12, 2022, regarding 35 feet height limitation in the Central Business District (CBD)

A conversation ensued regarding the outcome of the recently held Community Open House, January 12, 2022, regarding the current 35-foot height limit in the CBD.

It was the consensus of Council to postpone adding the topic to the ballot of the upcoming November 2022 election. Additional community education and Open Houses would be offered regarding this topic. The City Clerk would provide information regarding the deadlines to possibly include this topic on the ballot at a future election.

Mr. Shepard stated he sent a revised version of the ordinance [on file] with all agreed changes suggested during the Charter review meetings. City Manager Mike Staffopoulos informed the

Council a copy of the proposed ordinance with the Charter changes would be sent to the Council at least two weeks before the first reading of the ordinance for review.

The purpose of the Briefing was to update the Council members about ongoing items in the City.

City Manager

Remote Participation

City Manager Mike Staffopoulos stated the City currently has no policies regarding a Council member's virtual attendance at a regular Council meeting. Mr. Staffopoulos explained the City Attorney opined virtual attendance at a regular Council meeting as allowable, provided specific criteria are met.

The Council was provided with three documents [on file] for reference: City of Neptune Beach Resolution Regarding Remote Attendance at Meetings; State of Virginia Remote Participation Statute; and City of Jacksonville Beach Draft Resolution Regarding Remote Participation (drafted by City Attorney). City Attorney Sandy Robinson reviewed the documents with the Council.

A conversation ensued regarding different criteria and options in the draft Resolution regarding remote participation. The Council's consensus was to revise the draft resolution, including the discussed changes, and bring the draft resolution to a Council Briefing for further review.

Park Signs and Rebranding

Parks and Recreation Office Administrator Molly Alleger, explained most of the parks and facility signs need renovation due to weather and age. Ms. Alleger said the topic of renovating the welcome sign on A1A at the south entrance of the City was brought up in a recent Council Briefing. She stated Staff does not wish to proceed with the rebranding of signs or refurbishing one sign in the community without a discussion with the Council on the ability to coordinate a consistent brand (theme, logo, and colors) on all signage.

Ms. Alleger presented images of current park signs compared to potential new signs [on file] to the Council. A conversation ensued regarding different design options and possibly hiring a company to professionally design the signs and assist with branding.

It was the consensus of the Council to refurbish the current welcome sign on A1A at the south entrance of the City. Ms. Alleger would work with local companies to obtain suggested branding and design for the signs and present these ideas to the Council as a follow-up discussion item at a future Council Briefing. Touch-ups on current signage throughout the City would take place until a final decision was made regarding the entire project.

Urban Trails Update

Director of Parks and Recreation Jason Phitides introduced Jim Harriott, Laurie Hall, and Craig Brashier of CHW Professional Consultants to provide a presentation [on file] of the Urban Trails Master Plan. A conversation ensued regarding residential area concepts, commercial area shared streets, and trail types.

It was the consensus of the Council to have the project continue forward as planned, and more detailed information would be provided at an upcoming Council Briefing.

Committee Assignment Report

Mayor Hoffman referenced the upcoming Pension Board interviews. She suggested only Pension Board applicants should be interviewed next week, and any other applicants for other Boards could be interviewed at a later date. It was the consensus of the Council to keep the upcoming Pension interviews separate from other board interviews.

Future Briefing Topics

None.

BACKGROUND

The Jacksonville Beach Police Department purchased the Skywatch Platform Lift in the 2009-2010 JAG grant cycle. The Lift is a trailer-towed, generator-powered platform which elevates to a height of approximately 20 feet. It is used for elevated observation during special events. Over the last few years, we have only sporadically deployed the Lift as it is labor-intensive to set up, and requires specific technical training to operate. Staffing levels are also a consideration in using the Lift as you need more than one person to operate and observe in crowded areas. There are other safety issues to take into account, too. Due to its age, we have encountered numerous mechanical problems with the generator which requires a special service vendor other than First Vehicle Services to work on. It has already been sanded, painted, and re-stripped in the past. It is in need of this service again, at a cost of about \$5,000.

One entity who has consistently requested and used the Lift is the Duval County School Police for football games at Fletcher Middle School. They have a strong interest in receiving this equipment for their future use. The Department of Justice and FDLE administrators have already given approval of this piece of equipment as a donation to a fellow law enforcement agency.

BACKGROUND

In an effort to secure existing City infrastructure, Administration seeks to install proximity card readers at the primary entrances and strategic internal access points of the following City facilities:

- City Hall
- Operations & Maintenance Building
- Police Department

The access control solution includes software that will be installed on the virtual COJB server. The software is browser based, accessible to designated staff members via active directory sign-on to allow flexibility to manage the system without designated workstations. The system is designed with access control and reader modules that support open field hardware, allowing the COJB to use non-proprietary field hardware. The access controlled doors will use card readers that support an array of credential technologies and are built on a hardware platform designed to be adaptable to support future technology. The doors will be secured with electrical locking hardware that will vary by door. The doors will be secured using electric strikes, magnetic locks, or electro-mechanical conversion kits for various doors that cannot be equipped with strikes or magnetic locks. The access controlled doors will include the card reader, locking hardware, door contacts, passive infrared motion, emergency request to exit on doors with magnetic locks and new cabling. In addition, the system includes the badge printer and software to create new City ID badges, with built in access rights, for additional security.

The total cost of \$307,765 to purchase and install the Proximity Card Access Control Readers at the three COJB locations also includes a 15% contingency and pricing for the first year's service agreement. BACKGROUND

The emergency backup generator located at Liftstation #3 is at the end of its life and replacement parts to keep it operating are unavailable. This generator is located at 1024 4th Street South (at the intersection of 10th Avenue South). The generator was manufactured on 12/11/1983, making it 38 years old. This generator was originally designed to run at 208 volt output and was modified in 2003 to supply the needed 480 volts after the liftstation was upgraded. We have also had to add an additional isolation box in order to have the generator serviced, and it currently suffers from multiple oil and coolant leaks and a failure of the fuel throttle body, with parts currently unavailable for repair. During the last 10 years, replacement parts have had to be located through salvage yards or eBay to keep this generator in operation. This generator needs to be replaced prior to the next hurricane season.

Staff requests approval for purchase of this emergency generator utilizing a Sourcewell Agreement (State Bid) for cost savings.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The total project cost is \$93,379: \$77,816 for the generator and a 20% contingency of \$15,563. This purchase is being requested outside of the current Capital Improvement Plan however, funding is available in the Water and Sewer Fund operating reserve. The funds will be spent from the following account: 420-07-0706-535-63-563000 and the budget will be amended as part of the mid-year budget adjustment.

BACKGROUND

Under the approved Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for FY2022-2026, the Vehicle and Heavy Equipment Replacement Program in the Public Works Department calls for the purchase of a new Vactor 2100i Vac Truck - Dual Axle at a cost of \$420,000, the purchase of a new International 4300 Clam Bucket Truck at a cost of \$170,000, the replacement of the Terex mini excavator in the amount of \$60,000, the replacement of the Caterpillar backhoe in the amount of \$130,000, and the replacement of the Caterpillar rubber-tired excavator in the amount of \$265,000 for FY2023. These vehicles are currently experiencing extremely long lead times due to chassis supply issues. It is the desire of the Public Works Department to accelerate the order for these five items to assure delivery in the first two quarters of FY2023, and avoid upcoming price increases. If ordered today, these vehicles would not be delivered before October of 2022.

The Vac Truck is recommended to be ordered from Environmental Products Group utilizing the Sourcewell Agreement (State Bid) for purchase. The current price is \$441,918, plus \$14,312 in additional options, for a total of \$456,230.

The Clam Bucket Truck is recommended to be ordered from Cumberland Truck under the Florida Sheriff's Association Contract Bid FSA20-VEH18 in the amount of \$179,115. The current mileage on the existing 2013 vehicle is 85,300.

The Terex mini excavator is a 2004 model and is recommended to be replaced with a Caterpillar 304 hydraulic excavator from Ring Power in the amount of \$59,617.

The Caterpillar 420 4x4 Backhoe has reached its trade-in duration and is recommended to be replaced with a Caterpillar 420 4x4 Backhoe from Ring Power in the amount of \$119,455.

The Caterpillar Excavator has reached its trade-in duration and is recommended to be replaced with a Caterpillar M318 Excavator from Ring Power in the amount of \$282,510.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Funding is available in the Water and Sewer, Sanitation, and General Capital Projects funds operating reserves. The financial impact by fund is: Water and Sewer fund (\$515,847), Sanitation fund (\$179,115), and General Capital Projects fund (\$401,965). The funds will be spent from the following accounts and the budgets will be adjusted as part of the mid-year budget adjustment.

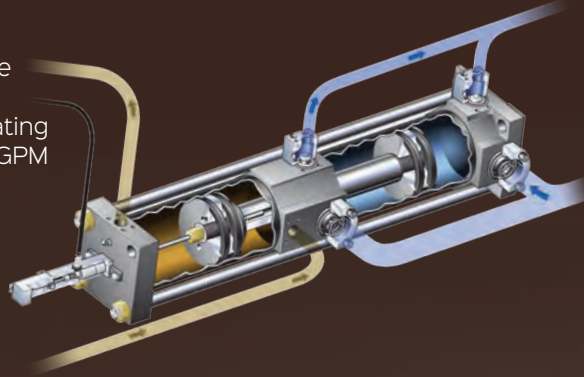

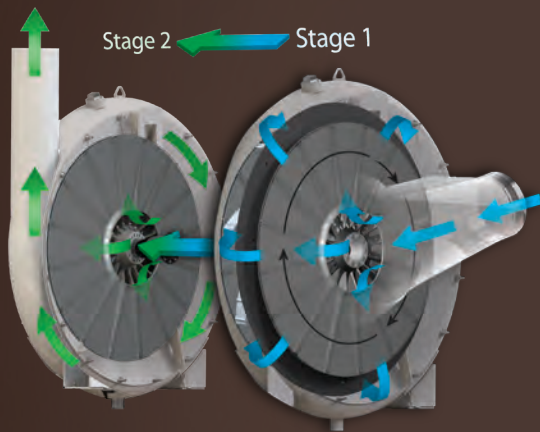

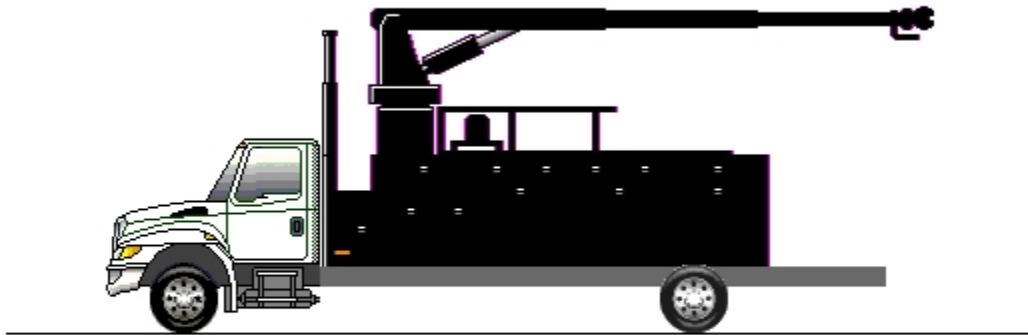

BACKGROUND

The City participates with the City of Jacksonville, along with the other Beach cities, in sharing the Entitlement Funding our region receives from Federal Community Development Block Grants (CDBG). CDBG funding must be expended to improve the quality of life for low and moderate income families. In the past, the City's allocation was used to fund the Community Assisted Policing Effort (CAPE) Program as well as the Carver Center Recreation Program.

In FY2022-2023, we will not be eligible for funding for the CAPE Program, as we have exceeded the threshold percentage of households that are below 80% median income within the census tract. However, we are requesting full funding in our application for the Carver Center Recreation Program. The funding request is to cover the salaries and benefits for two staff members, the Recreation Supervisor and Recreation Leader at the Carver Center.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The total amount of the grant request is \$127,887.74. Continuing this program at the same service level during FY2022-2023 requires approximately \$290,264.40. In FY2021-2022 we requested \$119,640.93 and received \$114,418 for this program.

BACKGROUND

Bid No. 2122-05 Golf Course Tree Services was advertised from November 17, 2021 to December 22, 2021. The intent of Bid No. 2122-05 is to award a non-exclusive, continuing services contract to a qualified, experienced, and licensed contractor for tree removal and trimming services for the Jax Beach Golf Club, including various City parks and other areas designated by City personnel. The scope of work will encompass the removal of trees, stump grinding, stump removal, tree trimming, clean up, and disposal of trees and debris, as well as technical assistance.

To be eligible to bid, licensed contractors were required to demonstrate at least five years of experience providing such services on golf courses, including contact references and project details. Also, bidders were required to demonstrate adequate organization, facilities, equipment, personnel, and other resources necessary to ensure prompt, efficient, and satisfactory service to the City, and guarantee 24-hour response time to the City. Equipment requirements included flotation tires to prevent rutting or damage to the golf course turf.

One response was received, with staff recommending award of Bid No. 2122-05 to Odom's Beaches Tree Service, Inc., the lowest qualified bidder. Odom's Beaches Tree Services, Inc. has previously performed contract services for Parks and Recreation to acceptable standards of the City. The bid tabulation form is attached. Who's This?

One of the most traumatic moments in a Navy careerman's life is that moment when he takes a rear-view look at 32 years of his life.

BMCM Charles D. Holland, began his long journey with the Navy in August 1942. His first effort at joining the Navy after Pearl Harbor ended in failure, but 80 days later he was successful. He enlisted in Wilmington, N.C. and was sworn in at Raleigh, N.C.

"Basic training," the Master Chief recalled, "was a brief but trying affair. In three weeks they filled our mouths with lead fillings, our sea bags with gear and our bodies with 100 shots -- immunizing us against every known disease."

"Twenty-one days after raising my hand, and getting lost in New York City, I reported aboard the USS Massachusetts (BB 59) berthed at Portland, Me. The next morning Mass headed for North Africa and 7 days later we exchanged gunfire with shore batteries.

"The engagement lasted 18 hours. Mass incurred damage and set a record for Atlantic crossings (96 hours). She was in port at Norfolk 5 days for re-outfitting on a round-the-clock basis and then she headed for the Pacific.

"Our Skipper told us," Chief Holland recalled, "there were 900 islands in the Pacific and Mass would probably see all of them." For 26 months they tried. Among some of the well remembered names were Truk, Magmag (in the Mariannas), Okinawa, Siapan, Tinnian, Philippines and the battle churned waters of Lingayen Gulf.

Mass, returned to the States for a needed overhaul. When settled in Seattle Shipyards the men were given 30 days leave. Then she returned to the Pacific for 21 months.

"It was nothing to remain on General Quarters for a week at the time. We ate, slept when we could, worked at our duty station. We operated for three month periods and stood four hours on and four off and sometimes eight on and eight off.

Navy offered me First Class to stay, but I wanted out. I finally settled on going Reserve, and then: I went home. My brother and I decided to go back in together. We wanted to be on the same ship and we pursued that idea for two years. He came up the gangplank of the USS Palute as I came down -- and that's the way it went."

"In all my years with the Navy I've served on 22 ships and a number of shore stations. The most outstanding ships were the USS Massachusetts and the USS Cambair (APA 36 -- but they were all interesting and exciting.

"I've served on every type of ship except minelayers, but I worked with them -- PhibLant, ServLant, AirLant, DesLant, and more. I was always curious as to what the other guy was doing."

As Chief Master-At-Arms for the Navy in Central Florida, Master Chief Holland investigated more than 57 deaths -- homicides, suicides, and murders.

"One murder investigation I recall," he said, "required 700 pages of investigation materials. We provided 370 pages of it from our operation. People don't realize what law enforcement officers go through."

Master Chief Holland's men love and respect him.

"I served with this man in Korea and in Vietnam, and as far as I'm concerned, he's the best. I'd follow him anywhere." MMJ J.C. George (Master-at-Arms) is only one of his men, but the consensus of opinion is the same.

"I am an E-9 today because of what my men did. A man in the Navy advanced on the accomplishments of his men," Master Chief Holland asserted. "The men work as a team. Singularity has no place here."

The Master-At-Arms force is a versatile group with many and varied duties. Master Chief Holland laughingly recalled an

The next day at 1400 the Skipper, then Captain Poorman, took a swipe at coming in. Halfway down the channel it became evident that it was impossible, so the Skipper backed that carrier out through the jetties into safe anchorage.

The next day at 1700 Shang tied up at the dock. 3500 happy worn-out dependents disembarked leaving a crew of tired but proud sailors.

"Every man took joy in doing his job well," the Master Chief concluded. "I've never seen men give so much of themselves as these men did."

Master Chief Holland retired last Friday. He and his wife Caroline, sons Chuck and Jerry and daughter, Jackie, will make their home in Jacksonville Beach. Chuck, age 22 and Jerry age 19, are studying Data Processing Analysis at Jones College. Jackie, age 9, helps her mom at home.

"If there is any credit to be recognized, it would have to go to my wife." The Master Chief beamed with a pride of the devoted family man.

"We've been married more than 25 years and more than two-thirds of that time I was aboard ship. It takes an exceptionally outstanding woman, one who's superior in every way to understand the demands of a sailor's life. If I could I'd give her the highest award a Navy man can get."

In summing it up, Chief Holland found himself at a loss for words with regard to his men. He paused, mused and said:

"I was fortunate to get Mayport for my twilight cruise. The officers and men here have given me 110 percent support. I feel there is a great future for Mayport. Maybe some people may be cutting themselves short if they have an idea that the Navy's not great. The Navy's over 200 years old and the people who were here before us had to give a hell-of-a-lot of themselves to make it great for us. We need to give to those who will come after us."

"I can see a smaller, more efficient, less wasteful type of Navy. My only regret is that it's time for me to retire. In my 30 years experience, I have never met any people in the world better than the people who serve in the U.S. Navy. The Navy stands up and looks

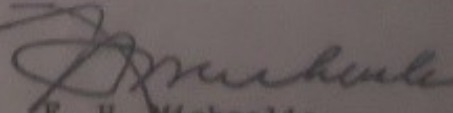

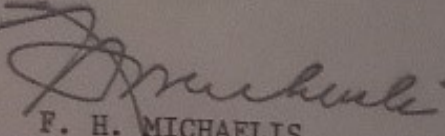

SUBJECT:	Ordinance No. 2021-8168 Outdoor Seating Amendments

BACKGROUND

At the August 9, 2021 briefing, City Council indicated support for amendments to Section 34-407 of the Land Development Code (LDC) in regard to outdoor restaurants and bars, specifically as it pertains to the ratio of allowable outdoor restaurant seating, and the seating calculations for restaurants to qualify for a special restaurant (SRX) alcoholic beverage license (4COP).

The outcome of the discussion on August 9, 2021 is summarized as follows:

- Support for amendments to Section 34-407 of the LDC to increase the ratio for allowable outdoor seating areas at restaurants Citywide at a minimum of a 50% ratio.
- Support for amendments to Section 34-407 of the LDC to allow outdoor restaurant seating areas Citywide to count towards the 150 seats required to qualify for a 4COP (SRX) alcoholic beverage license. It was discussed that establishments with a 4COP (SRX) and outdoor restaurant seating areas would potentially not be eligible for extended hours of operation permits in an effort to avoid the creation of additional restaurants in name only (RINOs). Additionally, 4COP (SRX) establishment's outdoor restaurant areas would remain subject to Section 4-2.(e)(1)b.4 which requires 4COP (SRX) establishments to keep all tables and chairs upright and in place during all hours of operation as per the diagram submitted to the city during the permitting process.
- Consider amendments to Section 34-407 of the LDC to increase the ratio for allowable outdoor bar areas, but perhaps at a future date.
- Consider amendments proposed in Ordinance 2017-8093 that would allow outdoor restaurant areas approximately 200 sq. ft. in size that do not serve alcohol to be permitted without having to receive conditional use approval and without having to provide for additional parking.
- Support for review and consideration of amending any definitions related to restaurants and outdoor restaurant areas to ensure clarity and consistency with other parts of the City's Code of Ordinances.

City Council also expressed some concern about potential consequences of the proposed changes discussed, such as the potential creation of new RINOs, impacts on parking, compatibility concerns with other uses, and unintended loopholes. Staff addressed these concerns with the City Council.

Staff took the City Council's requests and concerns into consideration and provided some

proposed amendments to the LDC at a subsequent September 13, 2021 briefing. The City Council confirmed their preferred amendments to the LDC and staff has prepared the attached draft Ordinance for consideration by the Planning Commission prior to final review and consideration by City Council.

The proposed suggestions for amendments to pertinent sections of the LDC in relation to outdoor restaurant areas are summarized as follows:

- Update the definition of *outdoor restaurant area* to match the definition in Section 18 - Noise of the City's Code of Ordinances.
- Allow outdoor restaurant areas of 250 square feet or less, at establishments where alcohol is not served, as a permitted use in certain commercial zoning districts where restaurants are a permitted use.
- Remove the parking requirement for outdoor restaurant areas less than 250 square feet.
- Amend the outdoor restaurant area allowable ratio from 25% of the indoor restaurant area to 50% of the indoor restaurant area.
- Allow outdoor restaurant seating areas to be used to compute the minimum seating area required to qualify for a 4COP (SRX) alcoholic beverage license.
- Require a buffer around outdoor restaurant or bar areas that are immediately adjacent to residential uses.

The proposed amendments were considered by the Planning Commission at their regular meeting on November 22, 2021. After discussions with staff, the Planning Commission recommended approval of the amendments with one proposed addition. The Planning Commission voted to add language to Section 34-407 that clarified that "existing outdoor seating areas shall not be expanded without first receiving conditional use approval." Staff has provided this language as red/underline text in the proposed ordinance, under Section 34-407(b) of the LDC.

Ordinance No. 2021-8168 was approved by the City Council at its first reading on December 20, 2021 without amendments. The second reading was approved to be scheduled for January 18, 2022, but was deferred to February 7, 2022 due to an error in publishing the notice.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENACTING AND ESTABLISHING A COMPREHENSIVE LAND DEVELOPMENT REGULATION AND OFFICIAL ZONING MAP FOR THE INCORPORATED AREA OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, AS AUTHORIZED BY CHAPTER 163.3202, FLORIDA STATUTES, BY AMENDING ARTICLE IV. DEFINITIONS, ARTICLE VII. ZONING DISTRICTS, AND ARTICLE VIII, DIVISION 2. SUPPLEMENTAL STANDARDS, TO MODIFY THE LIMITATIONS AND CONDITIONS FOR OUTDOOR RESTAURANTS AND BARS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville Beach ("City") has the authority to adopt this Ordinance pursuant to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida; and Chapters 163 and 166, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, the City Code of Ordinances, Chapter 34 Land Development Code (LDC) exists to establish comprehensive and consistent standards, regulations, and procedures for the review and approval of all proposed development of land in the City and to implement the goals of the Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City finds it necessary to periodically review and make amendments and revisions to the LDC to provide clarifications, address new issues pertaining to regulations and procedures, make updates, enact new portions, and reorganize parts; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has expressed interest in modifying the language and regulations pertaining to outdoor restaurant areas, the requirements to qualify for a special restaurant alcoholic beverage license, and clarify definitions pertaining to restaurants; and

WHEREAS, the City's Planning Commission, after notice and public hearing, has considered the ordinance and the proposed amendments, clarifications, revisions, updates, and reorganization to the articles, divisions, and sections of the LDC, has considered staff recommendations, information provided, and public testimony given at the public hearings and has presented its recommendation to the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby finds that this Ordinance serves a legitimate government purpose, it is a permissible exercise of the City's powers and authority, and benefits the public health, safety, and welfare of the citizens, residents, and guests of the City of Jacksonville Beach.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. RECITALS. The above recitals are ratified, correct, and made part of this ordinance.

SECTION 2. That Article IV. Definitions, Section 34-41. – General, of the Land Development Code of the City of Jacksonville Beach, Florida is hereby amended, and as amended shall henceforth read as follows¹:

Outdoor restaurant or bar means any restaurant or bar, or portion thereof, which exists outside of the permanent exterior walls of the principal building(s) on a lot and has, in place, tables and chairs set up to accommodate patrons for seating during all hours of operation. This definition includes any deck or other area constructed and/or utilized on the roof of a structure.

SECTION 3. That Article VII. –Zoning Districts, Division 2, of the Land Development Code of the City of Jacksonville Beach, Florida is hereby amended, and as amended shall henceforth read as follows:

Section 34-342. Commercial limited: C-1.

(b) Permitted uses.

(7) Restaurants, except drive-ins; and outdoor restaurants less than or equal to 250 square feet if alcohol is not served.

Section 34-343. Commercial limited: C-2.

(b) Permitted uses.

(11) Restaurants; and outdoor restaurants less than or equal to 250 square feet if alcohol is not served.

Section 34-345. Central business district: CBD.

(b) Permitted uses.

(4) Retail trade establishments as follows: Building materials, hardware and garden supplies; general merchandise stores; apparel and accessory stores; home furniture, furnishing and equipment stores; restaurants; drug stores; florists; tobacco stands and newsstands; optical goods stores; and miscellaneous retail goods; and outdoor restaurants less than or equal to 250 square feet if alcohol is not served.

SECTION 4. That Article VIII. –Site Development Standards, Division 2 –Supplemental Standards, Section 34-407. –Outdoor restaurants and bars, of the Land Development Code of the City of Jacksonville Beach, Florida, is hereby amended, and as amended shall henceforth read as follows:

**ARTICLE VIII.
SITE DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS
DIVISION 2.
SUPPLEMENTAL STANDARDS**

Sec. 34-407. Outdoor Restaurants and Bars

In addition to the standards applicable to all conditional uses, as stated in Section 34-231, and in addition to the regulations of the zoning district in which the restaurant or bar is located, outdoor

restaurants and bars that are permitted or allowed in any zoning district shall be subject to the following limitations and conditions:

(a) The unenclosed, outdoor portion area of the restaurant or bar shall be accessory to ~~or~~ and under the same ownership or control as the restaurant or bar that is operated within a totally and permanently enclosed building located on the same lot.

(b) The area of unenclosed, outdoor customer service area of a restaurant shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the total gross enclosed area of the restaurant. The area of unenclosed outdoor or bar shall not exceed twenty-five (25%) of the total enclosed area of the restaurant or bar. Existing outdoor seating areas shall not be expanded without first receiving conditional use approval.

(c) Required parking spaces shall be provided for the unenclosed, outdoor customer service area outside of the permanently enclosed building at the same ratio as is required for the permanently enclosed area of the restaurant or bar. Parking is not required for outdoor restaurant areas of 250 square feet or less.

(d) The outdoor customer service area ~~shall not~~ may be used to compute the minimum seating or customer service area required to qualify for a special restaurant (SRX) alcoholic beverage license. For any establishment selling alcoholic beverages for on-site consumption, the outdoor customer service area shall be enclosed by a minimum 42" high wall or fence. The wall or fence shall be constructed of wood, metal (Except chain link), plastic, or other similar material. No rope of any kind shall be permitted.

(e) Buffering must be provided around outdoor restaurant or bar areas when immediately adjacent to residential uses. At a minimum, a six-foot tall fence should be installed between the commercial and residential uses, or a thirty-six (36) inch diameter pot by a minimum of twenty-four (24) inches high should be provided every five (5) lineal feet of outdoor restaurant area immediately adjacent to a residential use. The plant species should be at least two (2) times as high as the height of the pot.

(~~ef~~) No animals except service dogs shall generally be permitted within an approved outdoor restaurant or bar seating area. However, pursuant to Ordinance No. 2010-7992, other dogs may be allowed in an outdoor restaurant area upon approval of a Dogs in Outdoor Dining Area permit application.

(~~fg~~) The Planning Commission is authorized to establish hours of operation for conditional use outdoor restaurant and bar seating areas as a means to ensure their capability with surrounding land uses.

(~~gh~~) If an approved outdoor restaurant or bar area violates any of the standards set forth in this section, or any other conditions placed on their approval by the Planning Commission, the violation shall be referred to the Special Magistrate for a hearing. Upon finding that such a violation exists, the Special Magistrate may apply penalties as provided by law, including revocation of the conditional use approval for that outdoor seating area. Whenever the approval for a conditional use outdoor bar or restaurant seating area is revoked for a particular establishment, a conditional use application for outdoor bar or restaurant seating shall not be considered for any portion of that establishment for a period of two (2) years after the date of revocation.

SECTION 5. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. SEVERABILITY. It is the intention of the City Council that if any section, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance is deemed invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion will become a separate provision and will not affect the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. CODIFICATION. The City Council intends that this Ordinance will be made a part of the City of Jacksonville Beach Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect upon final reading and approval by the City Council for the City of Jacksonville Beach.

BACKGROUND

The current City Code of Ordinances Chapter 33, "Vehicles for Hire," is no longer relevant or utilized by any City department. It serves no current or future purpose for the City. The City Clerk's Office does not utilize and has no intention of utilizing Chapter 33, either directly or indirectly, through department operations, policies, ordinances, or resolutions.

Section 33-51 of the Code of Ordinances requires applicants applying for a local business tax receipt (LBTR) to hold a permit, medallion, and vehicle inspection certificate issued by the City of Jacksonville. The City of Jacksonville ceased all permitting, inspections, and medallions for taxicabs/vehicles for hire in 2019.

As such, it is appropriate to repeal Chapter 33 in its entirety as part of the overall legal process to amend, revise, and improve the City Code of Ordinances and Charter.

Ordinance No. 2022-8170 Repeal of Chapter 33 - Vehicles for Hire was approved at its first reading on January 18, 2022.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact. The local business tax for a vehicle for hire is \$36.30 per vehicle per year per Section 33-57 of the Code of Ordinances. The City has not issued a LBTR for a vehicle for hire since 2016.

REQUESTED ACTION

Adopt/Deny Ordinance No. 2022-8170 repealing Code of Ordinances Chapter 33, "Vehicles For Hire," on the second reading.

ORDINANCE NO. 2022-8170

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA, TO REPEAL CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 33, "VEHICLES FOR HIRE," IN ITS ENTIRETY; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL, SEVERABILITY, CODIFICATION, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville Beach ("City") has the authority to adopt this Ordinance and to repeal its ordinances pursuant to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida and Chapter 166, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, City Code of Ordinances Chapter 33, Article II, "Vehicles for Hire," originally created in 2006, has become outdated and irrelevant since the inception of transportation network companies (TNCs) such as Uber, Lyft, and the like, and serves no current or future purpose for City business or operations for the reasons set forth below; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville found that the regulation of taxicabs, shuttle vehicles, and other vehicles for hire should involve as little governmental influence as is consistent with the public health, safety, and welfare, leaving to the play of free enterprise and market forces such matters as the number of vehicles for hire, the fares they charge and the business organization and identification they use; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville determined that in order to provide for this minimal governmental regulation and to restore and encourage free enterprise in the vehicle for hire industry, that the free market with limited government oversight of insurance and driver background check is the most effective method; and

WHEREAS, on April 9, 2010, the City of Jacksonville adopted Ordinance No. 2019-183-E repealing and replacing Ch. 220 of its Code of Ordinances governing vehicles for hire; accordingly, effective April 16, 2019, the City of Jacksonville ceased all permitting, inspections, and medallions for taxicabs/vehicles for hire; and

WHEREAS, the history of the City of Jacksonville's permitting, inspection, and issuance of medallions for taxicabs/vehicles for hire is relevant inasmuch as Sec. 33-51 of the City's Code of Ordinances requires that to obtain a local business tax receipt, an applicant must be the holder of a permit and medallion issued by the City of Jacksonville, and a holder of a current vehicle inspection certificate issued by the City of Jacksonville for each vehicle operating in the city limits of Jacksonville Beach; and

WHEREAS, the City does not have record of any taxicab companies and/or drivers who currently have an active local business tax receipt for operation within the City limits; and

WHEREAS, TNCs are governed exclusively by state law pursuant to F.S. §627.748; and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Beach City Council finds that the current City Code of Ordinances Chapter 33, "Vehicles for Hire," in its current form dating to 2006, has no current or future purpose or use by the City, so it can be repealed in its entirety.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF JACKSONVILLE BEACH, FLORIDA:

SECTION 1. RECITALS. The above recitals are ratified and made a part of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. REPEAL. City Code of Ordinances Chapter 33, "Vehicles for Hire," is hereby repealed in its entirety. The current Chapter 33, which shall be repealed, is attached hereto and incorporated into this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. It is the intention of the City Council that if any section, subsection, clause or provision of this Ordinance is deemed invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion will become a separate provision and will not affect the remaining provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. CODIFICATION. The City Council intends that this Ordinance will be made a part of the City of Jacksonville Beach Code of Ordinances.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final reading and approval by the City Council for the City of Jacksonville Beach.

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 33-16. - Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter the following terms shall respectively be deemed to mean:

Applicant includes every company or business proprietor who makes application to the city for a local business tax receipt to operate a vehicle for hire.

Driver includes every individual operating a vehicle for hire either as owner, agent, employee, or otherwise pursuant to a local business tax receipt issued as herein provided.

Vehicle for hire shall mean all motorized vehicles defined and classified in section 33-17.

Street shall mean and include all public streets, avenues, boulevards, ocean beach, alleys, lanes, highways, sidewalks, public parks, parking roads, and other public places laid out for the use of vehicles.

Taximeter shall mean a mechanical or electronic device which calculates and displays a predetermined rate and indicates the charge for hire of a taxicab and which also records and indicates a fare, rate or charge based on waiting time, extra passengers, initial charge and other fares, rates or charges.

Transport shall mean to operate or cruise over the streets of the city and its adjacent territory for the purpose of moving passengers or goods from one point to another.

Sec. 33-17. - Classification of vehicles for hire.

For the purpose of construing and applying the terms of this chapter all motorized vehicles which operate over and upon the streets and driveways of the city for the transportation of person(s) for compensation shall be classified and defined as follows:

- (1) *Bus*. Any bus, omnibus or other vehicle designed and constructed to comfortably transport seven (7) or more persons, which is not used for regularly conducted amusement rides or sight-seeing tours, and is not operated by another governmental agency.
- (2) *Cruising car*. Any vehicle for hire based upon a pre-established schedule of flat charges rather than by taximeter calculation, with an open touring or sedan body, designed and constructed to comfortably transport not more than six (6) persons, including the driver.
- (3) *Limousine*. A vehicle for hire only by prearrangement at a rate charged per hour, or fixed in advance, and is a chauffeured, luxury class passenger vehicle that is built or modified for the purpose as a limousine.
- (4) *Sightseeing cars*. A vehicle for hire designed and constructed to seat seven (7) or more persons used in regularly conducted sightseeing trips, which originate from and terminate at a single specified point, the destination or route of which is not under the direction of the passenger or passengers transported therein; which is not used as a means of local transportation within the city; and which neither receives nor discharges passengers along its routes.
- (5) *Taxicabs*. Any vehicle which is rented from a stand in the street or from a private station or garage, the destination and route of which is under the direction of the passenger or passengers transported therein, and fitted with a taximeter or other mechanical device by which the charge for hire is mechanically calculated by measuring and recording either the distance traveled with such vehicle or the waiting time or both.
- (6) *Van*. Any vehicle recognized as either a full-size passenger van or a passenger vehicle on a van or truck chassis. The term shall not include a cargo or panel van.

Sec. 33-18. - Manner of advertising

No holder of a local business tax receipt to operate a vehicle for hire shall be permitted to advertise such business before the public under any other name or names than the specified name or names recited in the particular local business tax receipt under which such holder is authorized to engage in the business of the transportation of person(s) for compensation within the city.

Sec. 33-19. - Printed matter appearing on a vehicle for hire, (except limousines); certain information required; advertising regulated.

- (a) The name of the company or firm operating a vehicle for hire shall be permanently displayed on both the right and left sides and the rear of the vehicle so that the name shall be plainly visible, with lettering at least four (4) inches in height, and made to reflect lights shined on them in the dark.

- (b) Each vehicle for hire shall have attached to the outside left rear portion of the vehicle the numbered medallion i by the City of Jacksonville.
- (c) Advertising matter on vehicles for hire shall be attached to the vehicle so that no portion extends below the bumper or beyond either side, and so as not to interfere in any manner with full vision through the rear window of the vehicle.

Sec. 33-20. - Inspection of vehicles.

It shall be the duty of the local business tax receipt holder to subject the vehicle to a complete and thorough inspection as required by the City of Jacksonville. Written certification of such inspection shall be maintained in the vehicle for hire while operating in the City of Jacksonville Beach.

Sec. 33-21. - Equipment and safety requirements for vehicles for hire.

All vehicles in service as vehicles for hire shall have the following equipment on each such vehicle, which equipment shall be maintained in good working condition:

- (1) Front and rear lights meeting state standards and a dashboard light that will indicate when any of the vehicle's doors are not securely closed;
- (2) Adequate brakes on all wheels;
- (3) Tires of the quality of original equipment as specified by the manufacturer, or better;
- (4) Speedometer in good working order;
- (5) Leather, vinyl, or some similar nonabsorbent fabric upholstery which can be easily cleaned and shall be free of tears and cuts;
- (6) Seatbelts for the driver and all passengers;
- (7) An unexpired A, B, C type fire extinguisher (minimum size of 2.5 lbs);
- (8) Adequate heater and air conditioner;
- (9) All seats in a shuttle vehicle shall be factory installed only;
- (10) Except for limousines, there shall be no shades, blinds or curtains between the rear seat or seats and the driver's seat, nor shall any shades, blinds or curtains shield the occupants or the for-hire driver from observation or obstruct the view through the rear window.

All vehicles for hire shall be maintained in a clean, well-painted manner so as to provide a generally good appearance. It shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle as a vehicle for hire which does not comply with the provisions of this section.

Sec. 33-22. - Meters required for taxicabs.

- (a) Every taxicab operating as a metered taxicab shall have affixed thereto, in operating condition, a taximeter.

(b) The face of every taximeter shall be visible from the passenger compartment of every taxicab at all times and, at sundown, shall be illuminated by a suitable light so arranged as to throw a continuous steady light thereon.

(c) No taxicab shall be permitted to operate as both a metered and non-metered (zone rate) vehicle. Each vehicle shall be identified in a manner to designate its status as a metered or non-metered vehicle.

Sec. 33-23. - Designation of taxi stands.

The city manager is empowered to designate the location of and extent of space for stands to be known as taxi stands on the streets within the city.

DIVISION 2. - OBTAINING LOCAL BUSINESS TAX RECEIPT

Sec. 33-50. - Required.

It shall be unlawful for any person owning a vehicle for hire to use, operate or run or cause or permit any of his agents or employees to use, operate or run such vehicle in, along, through, over or upon any of the streets of the city, or to carry on a business of transporting passengers for hire in such vehicle for hire in the city without first having obtained a local business tax receipt from the city clerk, as provided for in this division.

Sec. 33-51. - Application.

Application for a local business tax receipt shall be filed in writing with the city clerk, and such application shall set forth the following facts:

- (1) That the applicant is the holder of a permit and medallion issued by the City of Jacksonville, and same is affixed to each vehicle operated in the City of Jacksonville Beach.
- (2) That the applicant is the holder of a current vehicle inspection certificate issued by the City of Jacksonville for each vehicle operating in the city limits of Jacksonville Beach.

Sec. 33-52. - Local business tax receipt

No company shall be entitled to a local business tax receipt under this division until the company has paid all local business taxes due to the City of Jacksonville Beach.

Sec. 33-53. - Liability insurance prerequisite to issuance.

The application for a local business tax receipt shall include proof of a liability insurance policy providing for coverage of not less than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for property damage, one hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000.00) for any single injury in one accident and three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00) for multiple injuries in one accident, for each vehicle owned or controlled by such local business tax receipt holder.

Sec. 33-54. - Issuance.

(a) The city clerk shall promptly consider the application for a local business tax receipt under this division and, if such application meets all of the conditions of this chapter, shall cause the local business tax receipt applied for to be issued. All local business tax receipts issued in accordance with the provisions of this chapter shall expire on September 30 of each year. Said local business tax receipts as issued by the city clerk to such applicant shall contain, in substance, the following:

- (1) Those things that are set out in the application for the local business tax receipt;
- (2) The respective number and length of time for which the local business tax receipt is issued;
- (3) Any restrictions, qualifications, conditions and limitations upon which same is issued.

Sec. 33-55. - Posting.

Upon issuance of a local business tax receipt under this division, a copy of the same shall be securely placed in each vehicle and kept in plain view of the passengers riding therein. In addition, the following items must be kept in the vehicle for hire while operating within the City of Jacksonville Beach:

- (1) Vehicle for Hire Driving Permit issued by the City of Jacksonville, Department of Environmental & Regulatory Services;
- (2) Florida Vehicle Registration and proof of current liability insurance;
- (3) Valid Florida Driver's License;
- (4) Current Vehicle Inspection Permit.

Sec. 33-56. - Duration.

No license shall be issued for more than one year, and all licenses shall expire on September 30 of each year, except as otherwise provided by law.

Sec. 33-57. - Local business tax.

Before the issuance of any local business tax receipt under this chapter, the city clerk shall collect thirty-six dollars and thirty cents (\$36.30) per vehicle, per license year.

DIVISION 3. - RATES AND CHARGES

Sec. 33-65. - Schedule of rates to be posted.

There shall be posted in every vehicle for which a local business tax receipt is issued under this article, and in full view of the passengers in plain conspicuous letters, a schedule of rates, charges and fares which shall be binding upon the operator of the vehicle and any collection of rates, fares or charges, in excess thereof shall constitute a misdemeanor.

Sec. 33-66. - Charging rates in excess of posted rates.

No driver of a vehicle for hire shall charge or demand from any customer any sum of money in excess of those rates or charges posted in such vehicle.
